





FREEHOLD-The board of education last night adopted a proposed 1952-53 budget of \$445,550, after a public hearing attended by a group of teachers, who made no protest. The budget tops last year's record high of \$440,890

The budget calls for the raising by local taxation of \$273,127, including debt service. The balance of the budget is derived from other

Five board members voted for the budget, and two against, with two members absent. Of the two negative voters. Edward King. called the budget too large and Frank Witman said it was too small. District Clerk Ira A. Tilton called it a compromise budget.

Included among the items which go before the voters are current expenses of \$206,722; repairs and replacements of \$23,375; manual training, \$9,050; vocational agriculture, \$5,610, and capital outlay,

Mr. Tilton explained the increase over last year as due principally to increases in teachers' salaries and the increase in the cost of supplies and equipment. He pointed out that a sizeable decrease in the repairs and replacements item of \$4,625 resulted from the board' determination to cut those expenses to a minimum.\*

When released from there he had a serious heart condition, paralysis of one leg and a radium

### Announces Restricted Area Off Sandy Hook

Secretary of the Army Frank Pace, jr., announced yesterday that establishment of a restricted navigation area off Sandy Hook, requested by the Navy, has been approved. An Army spokesman said the area is to be used "for purposes of national defense." He said the nature of the use is confidential but that there is no element of "danger" attached to it.

The restrictions, which become effective Feb. 16, cover a circular area with a radius of 400 yards located in the Atlantic ocean about 1,200 yards west of Scotland lightship.

Restrictions prohibit vessels from anchoring, dragging, fishing or trolling in the area or passing between buoys on the perimeter of the area.

### Neptune Rate Rise to \$93.23 Seen in Budget

Township Schedule Adds Up to \$1,014,156.

Salary Items Are Higher

The Neptune township budget for 1952, which was introduced by the township committee last night, provides for appropriations totaling \$1,014,156,47, an increase of \$96,904.73 over last year's total. The base tax rate necessary to support the new budget will be \$93.23 per \$1,000 assessed valua-

tion, \$7.46 more than last year's

rate of \$84.77. A hearing on the

budget will be held Feb. 26. The increase in principal budget tems is in school expenses, the 1952 school figure of \$535,761.81 showing a rise of \$74,414.31 over last year's school budget. Local municipal expenses increased \$12,-477.43 from \$288,505.33 in 1951 to \$300.982.76 this year, and county taxes rose \$10.012.99. County taxes for 1952 total \$177,411.90. Percentage-wise, school expenses increased 6.12 percent, municipal ex-

penses .88 and county taxes .5. The taxes set forth in the municipal budget are not the total taxpayers will be required to pay, Township Clerk John W. Knox explained. The fire district budgets have not yet been adopted, he said, and are expected to be betwen \$50,000 and \$60,000. This will increase the final tax rate slightly, he said, the amount to be added after the fire district budgets are completed.

Almost all salary items in the budget section for municipal appropriations increased, the amount for police salaries rising from \$73,-100 in 1951 to \$85,700 for 1952, while the 1952 garbage and trash \$7.247 larger than last year's. However, the "other" expenses in most of the accounts where salaries increased were decreased partially to offset the rises.
