USED IT FOR CAR They said that Kenneth had used the money to buy himself an automobile instead, and that the father made threats that he would "get him" when he got out of prison.

But time has long since ceased to be a thing of moment for the man convicted of the "horrible murder ever committed" in the county.

He has dropped from sight without a trace, duplicating the cunning he used in disposing of his wife's body after killing her in their East Oakland home at 3923 Brown Avenue in January, 1928.

Suspected and convicted of the murder, it wasn't until after he escaped the death penalty that Antoine revealed the hiding place—and the sack of flesh and bones was recovered from the San Joaquin River.

Gov. Earl Warren, who as Alameda County district attorney, promised to establish Antoine so that he could get out on parole.

He has a bump on the back of his head, his right hand is swollen and bruised and his face, he said, "feels as if someone dislocated it."

SUFFERS COLLAPSE He collapsed this morning as police were taking him to Highland Hospital and officers said he kept calling for "Tony."

"I found I had about \$30, and swore that when my funds dwindled to \$5 and still no one recognized me, I'd either spend it consulting a psychiatrist or give it to a violin player."

WALKED AND TALKED "All yesterday I walked and talked to people. No one made much sense. My biggest impression was when I heard a violin play a concerto. It sent shivers down my back. After I heard it, I went to a music store and tried to play a violin, but I couldn't play it."

Although his wallet was missing, slips of paper carried handwritten words of what appears to be a song. The paper was of the sort given as advertising by a San Francisco printing firm, and carried an old San Francisco telephone number.

### Wife Slayer Escapes Prison; Vengeance on S.F. Son Feared

The disappearance of her husband's first wife, who led to his arrest and conviction.  
The bride wondered what had happened to the former wife and told her brother. He told police Antonio questioned first on suspicions of bigamy, told first one story then another.  
Police searched the house and the story unfolded. In the bedroom, where it had fallen unnoticed, was a dime-size piece of bone. Bloodstains were on the bed and the wall and on a hammer. The stays of a woman's corset turned up in a bonfire. Other bones were found in the ashes of the kitchen stove.  
This was the only "corpus delicti," but they were enough for Antonio's conviction. Then smugly he disclosed the rest of the story.  
Working constantly for 36 hours, he removed all the larger bones—stopping long enough to cook breakfast and dinner for his small son on the same stove in which he had burned the small parts of her body and some of her bones.  
Taking the other bones and most of the organs, he tossed them in a sack, drove to the river and discarded the remains in a slough well weighted down by rocks.  
At no time did Antonio express regret. His only explanation was that he had killed his wife so that he might marry Lyla.  
His stoicism apparently disappeared in prison and he was listed as a good worker, a good security risk and co-operative prisoner.

### EX-THEATER MAN, PHONE CO. ARGUES ACTRESS WIFE SHOT

NORFOLK, Conn., June 21.—(AP)—A former Boston theater manager and his actress wife were found shot to death here early today in what Dr. F. D. Urson, medical examiner, termed a murder and a suicide.  
State Police Maj. John C. Kelly identified the victims as Alfred Gordon Munro, 73, and his wife, Viola, about 55, a former monologue artist and lecturer.  
State Police Lieut. Elton Nolan of the Canaan Barracks said the shooting was discovered by Lester Roberts about 6 o'clock this morning when he went to get his automobile kept in a garage beneath the apartment where the Munros had lived for about six years.  
As Roberts started to enter the garage, he noticed blood dripping from the Munro apartment. He notified the state police who entered the apartment and discovered the bodies.  
Munro's body was lying on his bed, Nolan said, while his wife's body was on the floor.  
A revolver from which two shots had been fired was on the floor near Munro's bed.

### MYSTERY SUB HUNTED OFF FLORIDA

MIAMI, Fla., June 21.—(AP)—Search for an unidentified submarine reported off the south Florida coast centered near the new rocket testing range at Banana River today.  
Navy planes criss-crossed the area in an attempt to locate the underwater craft.  
The guided missile base is scheduled to open July 1. Legislation authorizing construction of the long range proving ground and providing \$75,000,000 to get it under way was signed May 11 by President Truman.  
Three Navy privateers from the hurricane-hunting squadron in Miami searched an area roughly off Cocoa and Melbourne during the night without finding a trace of the craft.  
Then the Coast Guard said the case had been listed as "classified" and that no further information could be obtained here.

### DIVINE SHIFTS 3 OFFICERS IN NEW STREAMLINE MOVE

In a move to consolidate police department records, Police Chief Lester J. Divine today announced the transfer of the identification bureau from the Inspectors Division to the Personnel and Training Division, and a shift of three officers.  
Lieut. Herbert L. Kline, now on enforcement duty in the Inspectors Division, was transferred to Personnel and Training, to supervise the new record system.  
The move was regarded as pointing to the eventual promotion of Kline to the post now held by Capt. Jesse Jackson, head of Personnel and Training, who is due for retirement in the near future. Kline now heads the eligible list for captaincy, as the result of a recent civil service examination.  
Henry Cutting, who came to Hollywood from Bainbridge, Mass., to try to become a song writer, also boasted he had killed five women, a neighbor told police.  
"I thought everybody knew I was joking," the suspect said.  
The arrest of Cutting in the brutal slaying of the 28-year-old hair-dresser followed an earlier announcement that police were questioning another suspect. The man, Leon Russell, 41, was already in jail for allegedly trying to break into the home of a woman—only two blocks where Mrs. Springer's strangled, mutilated body was found last Wednesday.

### WELLS GOES OUTSIDE CORPSE DECAPITATED

Light, Leo Wells, who has been heading the identification bureau in the Inspectors Division, was replaced on enforcement duty, replacing Kline. Sgt. Arthur J. McQuillan, now in Special Services, is promoted to Wells' post in the new setup.  
Divine said the move is primarily to consolidate all department records in one place, under one head.  
"At present the identification bureau is in the Inspectors division, while records of departmental personnel are kept by Personnel and Training. In addition, each division maintains its own records, and in some cases there are separate accumulations of records within divisions.  
"There is no one place where complete records are immediately available.  
"Under the new plan, all records will be filed with Personnel and Training. It will have charge of the Identification Bureau and will have copies of all division records, including traffic."  
NEW DIVISION LINES  
One of the first results from the consolidation will be a revamping of geographical divisions, Divine said. A check of records is expected to reveal where case loads are heavy, and a shift of personnel to those places will be made.  
Divine emphasized that the necessary changes can be made by transfer of beat officers and patrolmen and said no shifts in executive personnel are anticipated. He said the geographical changes may be made by the chief of job.

### Barkley Snubbed By Goy. Thurmond

COLUMBIA, S.C., June 21.—(AP)—Governor J. Strom Thurmond will not attend a national Democratic party fund-raising dinner here July 1 at which Vice-President Barkley will speak.  
The Governor, States' Rights Democratic presidential candidate Thurmond, said the dinner is "regrettable" that Barkley was visiting South Carolina in a political capacity, rather than as Vice-President.  
Former Governor Ransome J. Williams, finance chairman for the national party in South Carolina, countered that he found it "regrettable" that the state's governor would "snub" the Vice-President.

### WIFE SHOT TO DEATH IN GUN ACCIDENT

UKIAH, June 21.—(AP)—Mrs. Bretta Blossom, 50, wife of a San Mateo garage mechanic, was accidentally shot and killed by her husband Sunday night in their newly-purchased home at Empire Camp, Deputy Sheriff Reno Bartolome reported today.  
Bartolome said Roy D. Blossom told him the accident occurred while he was cleaning a .22 calibre rifle in the kitchen of their home. Blossom said he had disassembled it, filled the magazine and pumped all the shells out. He then reloaded the gun and was ejecting the shells a second time when the gun went off, sending a bullet through Mrs. Blossom's right breast.  
She died while being taken to a doctor at nearby Longvale. Sheriff Beverly G. Broadus said he had not yet been decided whether to hold an inquest. He said Blossom is not held and no charges have been placed against him.

### NDGW Go to Bat For Centennial

SAN JOSE, June 21.—Plans to ask the Legislature to reinstate unexpended funds of the statewide centennial celebration program were announced today by officials of the Native Daughters of the Golden West.  
In its 63rd annual session here, the NDGW Grand Parlor passed a resolution favoring the action, following a report by Mrs. Doris Treat Daley, immediate past president, president and chairman of the Grand Parlor Centennial Committee. Mrs. Daley is a member of the California State Centennial Advisory Committee appointed by Gov. Earl Warren.  
FUND CUT IN HALF  
Reaffirming the organization's interest in preservation of California history and honoring of the state's heroic pioneers, the NDGW resolution asks that the unexpended 1948-1949 centennial budget funds be devoted to the observances, in view of the fact that the centennial budget has suffered a 50 per cent cut by the Legislature Conference Committee.  
The slash in funds, the resolution points out, will necessitate cancellation of half of the commitments "made in good faith for 1949 to communities north and south, and will eliminate all the Centennial Commission's plans for the most important year of 1950, commemorating California's admission to statehood."  
The cut will also "compel the calling in of the historical caravan, the curtailing of the moving picture program and the cancellation of the state of historic spots and buildings."  
The organization urged the "Senate and Assembly to support special Senate Bill 1655... reappropriating the unexpended balance."  
The NDGW resolution states that according to the public announcement by the California Centennial Commission, no funds will be available for the Gold Rush celebrations this year and the observance of admission to statehood next year unless such action is taken.  
1000 DELEGATES  
More than 1000 members of Native Daughters units from all parts of the state are attending sessions at the San Jose Civic Auditorium. Registration is still under way for the four-day convention, which began today.  
Welcoming the delegates during the opening business meeting was Mayor Fred Watson of San Jose, who numbered the visitors among the United States most beautiful women.  
Stating that "California women are the most beautiful in the nation," Mayor Watson added, "I am delighted to find myself the only male in this auditorium—with the door closed."  
Today's schedule includes routine business, a memorial service for departed members. Convention activities are under the direction of Mrs. Margaret M. Farnsworth of San Jose.

### First Point Lost By 'Tokyo Rose'

Government prosecutors won a preliminary skirmish in Federal Court yesterday as final preparations for the trial of Mrs. Iva Toquiro D'Aquino, accused of broadcasting as "Tokyo Rose," neared.  
Mrs. D'Aquino is scheduled to go to trial on July 5.  
Federal Judge Michael J. Roche turned down defense request for permission to inspect documents, statements, scripts and photograph records seized in Japan as evidence.  
The request was made by Wayne M. Collins, chief counsel for Mrs. D'Aquino. He also was denied a list of government witnesses until three days before the trial opens. Judge Roche did allow an additional \$300 for defense expenses in obtaining depositions from witnesses in Japan.  
Meanwhile, Special Prosecutor Tom de Wolfe arrived in San Francisco to begin questioning 19 witnesses from Tokyo Sunday. He is to appear for the prosecution. Most of them are said to be employees of the radio station which produced "Tokyo Rose" shows.  
A list of 110 prospective jurors was drawn by James P. Welsh, court clerk. The large panel indicates that selection of a jury may take some time.

### KESSEL RULING AGAIN POSTPONED

EL CERRITO, June 21.—Decision in the El Cerrito Justice Court on whether David N. Kessel, owner of Contra Costa County gambling overland, and two co-defendants will be certified to the Superior Court on charges of felony bookmaking was postponed for the second time today.  
Judge Joe Marilyn Turner was expected to announce his decision today but because of a delay in receipt of court transcripts, the verdict will come next Tuesday at 1:30 p.m.  
Turner took the matter under submission on June 2 after a day-long preliminary hearing of Kessel and co-defendants, Francis D. O'Connell, 67, of 2215 Carroll Street, and Norman Crump, 47, of 6825 Avenal Avenue, both Oakland addresses.  
All three are free on \$2500 bail following arrests made here by El Cerrito police under the command of Capt. Howard Thulin.

### German Shipyard Owners Face Trial

HAMBURG, Germany, June 21.—(AP)—The owners of Germany's largest shipyard were committed today for trial on charges of illegally removing machinery scheduled for reparations.

# Antoine Son Defies Threat

Did Arthur Leroy Antoine, 56, escape from prison to get even with the son he said betrayed him?

Or did he, as the son claims, follow out a long-thought-of plan of escape, telling an "untrue" story to help cover his tracks?

Kenneth J. Antoine, 38 San Francisco cab driver, gave the version today, adding a conflict of father and son to the current puzzle of model prisoner and escaper.

The son, who 21 years ago slept in another room while his father bashed in his mother's head and then dismembered her body, termed the story of betrayal a "hunch of malarkey."

## LEGAL FREEDOM NEAR

Yet prison authorities, labeling Antoine as a trustworthy and cooperative inmate, have no other explanation for his sudden escape—when legal freedom seemed almost in his grasp.

Only hint to the solution has come from fellow inmates at the State Institution for Men at Chino. "They told me a bitter story—that Antoine, expecting a favorable report on his 10th parole application, had sent his son \$1500 to buy a gas station so that he would have a business to 'come out' to.

Instead, they said, the son used the money to buy a car. Enraged, Antoine threatened to 'get' Kenneth at any cost, the inmates revealed.

## SON'S VERSION OF 'DEAL'

Located at his home, 1028 Pine Street, San Francisco, Kenneth denied this story and said the father had given him \$300 and his brother, Roland, now living in Minneapolis, \$700.

The present was made, according to Kenneth, so that he could buy a car to make the trip to Chino to visit the father. He said he had about \$700 invested in an automobile and had the remainder in the bank.

He had seen him last November at Chino, he said, and at that time his father appeared hopeful of an early release on parole.

Told that his father had threatened to kill him, Kenneth shrugged off the "promise" of vengeance.

"I don't think much of that," he said. "I was in the Army and saw a lot better men than I am killed. Before that, I might have been scared. I don't think anything like that now."

Kenneth, former employee of the Oakland Naval Supply Depot, suggested that his father might have made the threats to direct attention to the Bay area—so he could escape the "other way" and get out of the country.

But the son, like the authorities, could advance no reason for the sudden change in the man who turned from notorious murderer into an outstanding prisoner—cooperative, trustworthy and respected.

## WORKED ON 'OUTSIDE'

Long typed as a minimum security inmate, Antoine frequently worked on the "outside," fighting fire in the harvest, and was sent from San Quentin to Chino more than a year ago.

He worked along on a field pump, outside the fence of the Chino institution, when he "just walked away." Chino, a minimum type institution, has no regular guards of strict security facilities.

"Stopping place" for men before they leave on parole, Chino has had virtually no escapes among 6000 men and authorities said they were "amazed" when Antoine took off.

Norma Andrade, 22, of Pleasanton is in first place with 110,150 votes; Barbara Archer, Livermore, Coordinating Council candidate, is second with 96,250 votes, and Elaine Rose of Newark, backed by the der control of the Personnel and Training Division.

# PLAN BOARD DELAYS ACTION ON PLEASANTON AIRPORT

Development plans for a Pleasanton airport were delayed today by the Western Pacific, cited an August, pending another public hearing on the question before the Alameda County Planning Commission.

The commission ordered consideration of the application at a special August 7 meeting after protests developed yesterday at a general meeting.

At issue is the application of Harry M. Lustig, Pleasanton flier, for a permit to build and operate an airport next to the Western Pacific right-of-way, Hacienda Road and Arroyo de la Laguna.

The railroad contended the planes, many to be used by student pilots, would be a hazard to trains and telegraph and rail communication lines. Residents near the proposed airport likewise declared it a potential danger and threat to property values.

The commission failed to second a motion by Commissioner Fred B. Mellman that the application be denied. Dying also of a lack of second was Mellman's proposal that a technical survey be conducted.

Carrick, however, was a motion by Commissioner John P. Gardella of Livermore that the matter be put over to the August 2 meeting.

Lustig pressed his application in a question and answer debate with Warren Conley, local Civilian Aeronautics Administration chief. Conley said the site was "equally as good" as other parts in the county and that the overhead wires at the end of the projected runway did not preclude opening of the port.

He added, however, that the CAA "would prefer that both ends of the field be clear."

# Police Expand Juvenile Work

Juvenile correction activities of the Oakland Police Department will assume full divisional status July 1, under the sweeping reorganization program now being put into effect by Chief Lester J. Divine.

He announced today that the juvenile detail, now part of the Inspectors' Division, will be consolidated with crime prevention work and expanded to a separate division, under the direction of Lieut. Thomas J. Rogers.

It will become the seventh division in the department. Rogers, who now heads the detail, will retain his lieutenant's rank for the present, but Divine said he plans eventually to ask the City Council to create a captaincy for the new division.

He said it will be staffed with an inspector, a sergeant, and planned clothes patrolmen.

All cases involving minors will be assigned to the new Juvenile Division, relieving other divisions of such matters. In addition, the new division will conduct educational and recreational programs designed to prevent crime, and will have the responsibility for checking licenses and permits where police problems may be anticipated.

He said all department records, including the identification bureau, traffic, and general divisional files, will be joined in a new bureau, under the control of the Personnel and Training Division.

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# U.S. Would Sell 148 Planes to Airlines

WASHINGTON, June 22.—(AP)—War Assets Administration has offered to sell 148 airplanes at prices ranging from \$10,100 to \$125,000 to 13 airlines now leasing them.

A spokesman for the agency said today the offer was made to an airline committee negotiating for the planes which include 114 two-engine DC-3 types and 34 four-engine DC-4 types.

A deadline of July 31 was put on the offer. The prices were based on the amount of time each plane has been flown.

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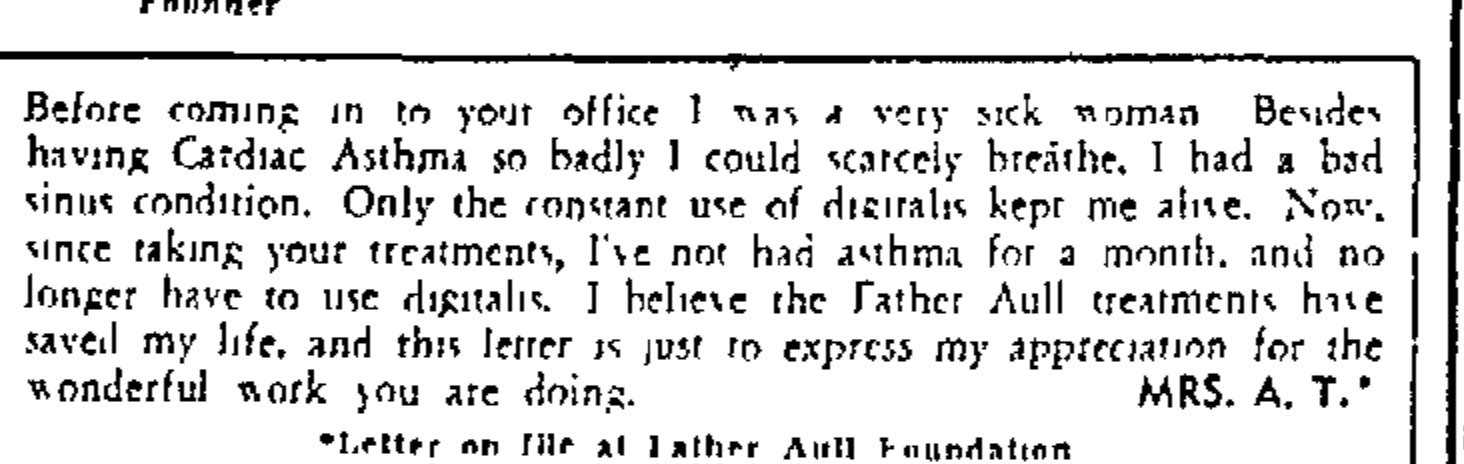

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# Body of Man Found in Bay
