That feeling was one of the factors behind the Illinois governor's long refusal to co-operate with those who sought to push him for the Democratic presidential nomination.

The robber entered the American Trust Company branch at a little before 3 p. m., calmly waited while Blomberg disposed of two other customers, then sat down beside Blomber's desk. He handed Blomberg an envelope.

"This letter will explain my call," he said.

The robber sat quietly while Blomberg began reading the letter, typed in red ink and single spaced. It began, recalled Blomberg, with the assertion that his wife was a captive, and would suffer harm if he did not do as







WITH THE UNITED STATES FIRST MARINE DIVISION IN KOREA-This happened only a week

ago but already it is enshrined in Marine Corps legends. I vouch for the facts.

Sgt. John Boitnott grew up in the hills of Kentucky, where he became a deadly shot with the long rifle. "Squirrels, wildcats, even cougars," drawls the lanky red head. "I could knock 'em all down."

He joined the marines and wound up in Korea on a remote hill outpost more than a mile in front of our lines. Digging in, he could survey quite a stretch of enemy territory.

What he saw he didn't like. Rocks and caves hiding Chinese snipers. When they started nipping the sand above his head he got sore. He fitted his rifle with a telescopic sight and waited.

But the Chinese were too smart for him. Masters of camouflage, they never gave him a target. He heard their bullets coming his way but he never saw the snipers.









U. S. Attorney Charges He Hoped to Get Loot

The cab driver who sought a hero's role in last month's bizarre theft of \$20,000 from a San Francisco bank was indicted yesterday for receiving and transporting stolen funds and harboring a fugitive from justice.

He is Anthony Gelini, 40, of 315 Capistrano Street. His cab was hailed by the bank robber after the theft had been committed.

Gelini subsequently drove the robber and the robber's roommate to Reno and then fled back alone to San Francisco with \$17,000 of the loot.

Thursday he made a final bid for glory. He went to the branch of the American Trust Company at Sixteenth and Valencia Streets, victim of the theft, to collect a reward.

Admitted Taking Money

At the same time, the Federal grand jury was considering his role in the events which followed the actual holdup. Gelini never got his reward and yesterday the grand jury handed down two indictments against him.

An indictment also was handed down yesterday against Charles F. Will, 33, the draftsman who had admitted taking the money from Walter Blomberg, the bank manager, after handing Blomberg a note indicating Blomberg's wife was being held as a hostage.

Indicted, too, was Sidney Dubowy, 33, who roomed with Will at 110 Walter Street, and went along on the ride to

Will was charged with robbery and Dubowy with receiving, possessing and concealing stolen funds not to exceed \$100, a misdemeanor.

Gelini's bail was fixed at \$5,000, Will's at \$12,500 and Dubowy's at \$500.

Gelini's self appointed role of hero fell apart, in the opinion of the FBI, when agents became convinced Gelini had not been held in virtual captivity during the trip to Reno, but on at least one occasion was alone in a bar with the money, then stashed in a briefcase.

Commenting on the indictment of Gelini after the jury had reported its findings to Chief Federal District Judge Michael J. Roche, Assistant United States Attorney Joseph Karesh said:

"Gelini was deeply involved in this matter.

"There were many times when Gelini was out of the presence of Will.
